

A regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held Tuesday, September 8, 2009 at 7:30 p.m. in the Aldermanic Chamber.

President Steven A. Bolton presided; City Clerk Paul R. Bergeron recorded.

Prayer was offered by City Clerk Paul R. Bergeron; Alderman Cox led in the Pledge to the Flag.

The roll call was taken with 14 members of the Board of Aldermen present; Alderman MacLaughlin was not in attendance.

Her Honor Mayor Donnalee Lozeau and Corporation Counsel James M. McNamee were also in attendance.

REMARKS BY THE MAYOR

Thank you Mr. President, members of the board. Tonight I would call your attention to the positive recommendation from the Budget Committee on the four union contracts on your agenda tonight; AFSCME Local 365, Police Supervisors, UAW professional, and UAW Technical.

As I said at your August meeting, I believe these contracts are fair to our city staff as well as to our citizens who are asked to fund them. While both sides could find things they would have preferred handled differently, I believe they strike a fair balance. I would extend my thanks to the negotiators on both sides for working together and getting the proposals to you within a month of the expiration date.

The two remaining contracts that expired June 30th are the Police Patrolmen and the Police UAW. Those discussions are on-going. I am hopeful those will be before you for your consideration soon.

I would also like to mention the fire this weekend at the Mohawk Tannery site. As you are all aware this is the second fire there, the first having happened in 2007. Early in 2008, I convened a meeting with City staff, NH DES, and the EPA to discuss options relative to the site. The first goal was to determine costs to demolish the buildings and secure the site. As you know the site is still privately owned and has for a long time carried a clean-up price tag of more than \$20 million. The good news is that a new process has been successfully utilized in other like sites. This new option carries a price tag closer to \$4 million. We continue to pursue ways to make that happen. Obviously we remain challenged with finding the resources to demolish the buildings in the interim, especially in these times.

As I have mentioned before, the Broad Street Parkway presents the best opportunity for private clean up and development of that site. At their meeting last month, the Business and Industrial Development Authority scheduled a site visit for this week. I want to assure you that I share your concerns as well as the neighbors' concerns about the safety of this site, and will continue to keep this as a priority. As always thank you for your kind attention.

RESPONSE TO REMARKS OF THE MAYOR

Alderman Plamondon

Thank you. I was going to wait until the end of the night to talk about the Mohawk Tannery, but since the Mayor brought it up, I want to thank you for bringing attention to this. This has been a thorn in the side of Ward 4 for many many years. Now with the second fire, in the last several weeks I have been in constant contact with the Police Department; it is not just neighborhood kids out there, it has become a favorite party spot for the 20 somethings. They are parking their vehicles along Fairmont, Little Florida, and all the way out to Broad Street, and they are going in there and having large bonfires and so on. It is becoming another favorite spot.

The police have been out there on their bicycle patrols and such, and we are trying to control the situation, but it has been one situation after another in that area. Bringing attention to this is greatly appreciated. I know I am really at my wits end with the problems there, and I know the neighbors have it worse. Thank you Madam Mayor for bringing attention and focus to this area. It is greatly needed. Thank you.

I have a correction Mr. President to the Special Board of Aldermen meeting minutes of August 20th. On page 2, paragraph 5, the last sentence the number \$4.5 million should be changed to read \$6.9 million so that the sentence reads: "Take a look at the total over those four years you have \$6.9 million increase in the budget and \$9.5 million increase in salaries."

Alderman McCarthy

Do we understand that that correction corrects something that is not correctly transcribed from the tape?

President Bolton

Can you answer that question Alderman Teeboom?

Alderman Teeboom

I don't know. All I know is the arithmetic does not properly add up at \$4.5 million. It does correctly add up to \$6.9 million and if you read the rest of the paragraph.

President Bolton

That is not grounds to correct the minutes. If it was incorrectly stated at the time, the minutes should reflect the incorrect statement. Unless you have knowledge that \$6.9 was said at the time and it got wrongfully transcribed to \$4.5 million, my suggestion is the minutes should stand as transcribed.

Alderman Teeboom

I suggest the Clerk review the minutes to see what was said, but my recollection is \$6.9 million, which reflects the correct arithmetic.

ON THE QUESTION

Alderman Teeboom

The recommendation is, in this communication, that President Bolton, expressing the sentiments of this Board, request Alderman MacLaughlin to resign. I have previously provided President Bolton with the address and phone number where Alderman MacLaughlin can be reached.

Several communications from Alderman MacLaughlin indicate his intention to return to the board following his release in November from a correctional facility in Lawrence, MA. The return to this Chamber by alcohol addicted individual, one who has been convicted of and imprisoned for repeated drunk driving, is a terrible proposition. This has nothing to do with the fact that less than two months remain in this term following his release or that it is too late at this time to replace him. It has everything to do with setting a terrible example for the citizens we, members on this Board, represent, and especially for our children, our grandchildren, and our great grandchildren.

Elected officials must provide examples of impeccable moral conduct. This Chamber is a very special place where the actions we take have a great affect on the lives of the citizens we serve where we are entrusted to do the right thing. This Chamber is no place for recovering alcoholics and addicts to seek rehabilitation.

Many citizens have contacted me asking for Alderman MacLaughlin's resignation. The Telegraph repeatedly asked for his resignation and lead editorials. Alderman MacLaughlin's continuing to serve as Alderman is an insult to our citizens and a continued embarrassment to our board.

I ask for a roll call to adopt this recommendation. Thank you Mr. President.

President Bolton

Is there further discussion?

Alderman McCarthy

Thank you Mr. President. I want to preface my remarks by saying first that were I in Alderman MacLaughlin's situation, I would likely have resigned at some earlier point when it became clear that I would not have been able to attend this Chamber for some period of time. I also want to make it clear that while I find Alderman MacLaughlin to be a colleague who is fairly easy to work with, I have never considered him a political ally. However, I agree with Alderman Teeboom that we ought to take seriously our duty to be very reasoned and make careful decisions in this Chamber. For that reason, I intend to vote against the motion that is in front of us.

In the years that I have served with Alderman MacLaughlin I can say that I have never seen him come into this Chamber in a way where I thought his judgment was impaired. We should bare in mind that the people of his ward have chosen him several times to be their representative through the term, and the only reason we ought to either seek his resignation or remove him, which would be the proper thing to do if we don't think he should serve on this board, is an inability to carry out that oath of office and represent those people who elected him.

Since he does not come in here in a condition that impairs him, the only thing that I think we can consider is whether his prolonged absence would in fact disqualify him, and whether we can mitigate that on behalf of his constituents.

His letters to us have indicated that he will be back in mid November. Were he to resign or were we to remove him, we could swear in the person who wins that seat for the following term approximately half way through the first meeting in November after we have certified the canvas of votes. We're talking about the possibility of mitigating the representation of those people with someone that they didn't choose for this term for one half of one meeting as a remedy. I don't think, from a logical standpoint, that makes sense.

I don't think there is any reason to go on this sort of witch hunt against members of this board who have not taken any action that impairs their ability to conduct the business of the board. I believe that whether Alderman MacLaughlin resigns or not is between him and his constituents at this point.

I couldn't help but notice when I came in this evening, that Alderman Teeboom's car is parked unlawfully in the parking lot. In fact, it is blocking the use of our van accessible handicapped spot as a van accessible slot because there is no part where one would get out of the van. While I think Alderman Teeboom owes the citizens of the city an apology for that and I think he may owe the city treasurer some money by now, I won't ask you to ask for his resignation and I won't ask you to ask for Alderman MacLaughlin's resignation at this point. While some of us may feel that it is okay to dispose of the victims of substance abuse in the same dust bin where they would put our students who require special education or people of dramatic extraction simply because they don't like them, I don't intend to join with that and I will vote against this motion that is on the floor. Thank you.

Do we know the success of the two crop zones that we currently have within the city, one on Northwest Boulevard out where 2-CPack is and there is another crop zone that is I believe, Alderman Plamondon correct me if I am wrong, I believe it is maybe parcels 105, 107, 108 within downtown, Ward 4?

Alderman Plamondon

Parcels or census tracks?

Alderman Cookson

Census tracks.

Alderman Plamondon

I am not sure if all of those census tracks are designated crop zones. I believe 108 is.

Alderman Cookson

Do we know the success of the current crop zones that we have within the city?

Mayor Lozeau

I can tell you that the first one that you mentioned on Northwest Boulevard has met with some great success. The downtown one I really can't comment on because I am not certain how many census tracks are in there. Census track 105, it might be 107, that runs along Front Street, as you know we are still struggling with that general area so I would be hesitant to say it is a resounding success, but I think both pieces of legislation here, irrespective of whether the others are a success, anything we can offer to businesses in our community that is a win/win I think is a good thing to do.

Alderman Cookson

Thank you.

Alderman Tabacsko

Thank you. I just wanted to note for the record that in the conversation and discussion that we had at the Planning & Economic Development Committee meeting on both of these pieces, the bottom line here is that the value of the property is enhanced by making these designations, and it may not be an immediate result, but it is something that certainly helps as time goes forward. I think it is one of those situations where there is really not a risk of a problem it is a matter of setting the stage so that when the development is ready to occur, it has the ability to do so. That is where my support came from.

PERIOD FOR GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

James Cutter, 86 Palm Street

Stated he has spoken to the board previously about a problem he is experiencing related to errors made by the city years ago. He read a letter written to Patricia Rogers, Citizen Services Director, Office of the Mayor, which outlined the issue he is dealing with. He remarked before going to the Legal Department with his issue, he went to the Assessing Office looking for help. The Tax Map for his property had been changed to agree with the 1950 building permit plot plan. He was informed the Tax Map and Deed should agree and can only be changed with a land survey. He remarked it took him a year of persistence from his visit to that office to correct the 88 Palm Street Tax Map to agree with the Deed as required by RSA 31:95-A. He commented they had changed the Tax Map in 1950 to agree with the building permit and now they were changing it to agree with the Deed. Stated he needs no additional proof of city errors.

He stated, now that he has pointed out a city error, that his neighbors cannot put a claim to a 3' wide strip of driveway and clothesline area because it is part of his privilege, and the land should be returned to him.

Stated he had a copy of a Building Permit and Land Use Application, which says the Plot Plan drawn to scale is required, and the plan shall denote property boundaries. Another sheet states building permits are required per RSA 676:11 in which it says submit the plans to the Building Inspector for his examination and approval. He remarked when that material was provided to the Building Inspector proper examination was not performed.

He would like someone from City Hall to notify his neighbors to remove their fence, etc., and return the property to him.

President Bolton

Previously I had offered the opportunity to speak at this time to Mr. Richardson, who apparently signed the wrong sign-up sheet earlier. I noted that Mr. Richardson is no longer in the audience.

REMARKS BY THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN

Alderman Teeboom

Commenting on the communication Mr. Richardson was not allowed to speak on at the beginning of the meeting, stated the President failed to read the entire text of the code book related to this issue. Stated Paragraph 5.14 I states "If there is reasonable expectation by the President of the Board that final action shall be taken on an order of business not on the agenda or considered in a communication, the President shall allow comment on that item of business." He stated the board was contemplating final action on an item included under communication and the President failed to allow Mr. Richardson to speak.

President Bolton

Remarked he did not have the code in front of him, and was quoting from the language that is written on the sign-up sheet, which itself quotes a section of the ordinance and not the entire ordinance. He went on to remark at the time he wished to speak, he no longer had any contemplation that any action would be taken as to Alderman MacLaughlin thereafter this evening, and thus far his expectation has proven correct.

Alderman Teeboom

Re-stated it says "contemplated" in the text. He felt if the clipboard does not contain the full text it should be corrected to include the full text to avoid such an error in the future.

Questioned Attorney McNamee if it is allowed, under the code, for the board to vote to seat the elected candidate from Ward 8 before the term is up should the board choose to remove Alderman MacLaughlin.

President Bolton

Responded it would not be a matter of the board taking a vote. The current provision in the City Charter requires if there is a vacancy that the successful candidate be sworn in as soon after the result is determined as is practical.

Alderman Teeboom

Stated that as the next term.

President Bolton

Remarked, although the question was posed to Attorney McNamee, he is providing the correct answer. He asked Attorney McNamee to state where he is incorrect if he is incorrect.

James McNamee, Esq.

Stated President Bolton's statement was correct. Under Charter Section 44, the last sentence says if the vacancy is for less than 6 months the candidate who receives the most votes at the regular municipal election for the next term, which is then vacant, who is not an incumbent member of the board, shall be sworn in to complete the unexpired term as soon as the election results are final.

Alderman Teeboom

Stated he would look forward to Alderman McCarthy moving to remove Alderman MacLaughlin the instant he reappears.

Alderman Flynn

Remarked he really did not comment when the four contracts were before the board. He was in favor of the contracts. He agreed with the comment the contracts were fair to the workers. Commented the board has to try to keep the notion that they want to be fair with all of the workers. He stated some of the contracts passed over the last two years were not consistent in what was asked of the various unions, and noted some examples.

Alderman Plamondon

Commented in late spring there was a situation in part of Mine Falls Park called Maple Island, which received a lot of press. At that time, there was one tent in there for a homeless resident who was beaten up. There was another shanty set up for a resident that did not live in there, but was there in the daytime. All other activity at that time was for 20-30 somethings who would go in there in large groups and party. That late spring the area was cleaned up and the individuals moved out. The attention now appears to be in the area along the Nashua River from Little Florida to Broad Street, and the Mohawk Tannery is in the middle of that area.

Stated his frustration with what is occurring in that area. He is working with residents in that area on creating a crime watch for the Fairmont Street/Little Florida neighborhoods. Anyone interested could contact either Alderman Plamondon or Ed Lecius at the Nashua Police Department.
